Service Projects

Students in Grade 10 are engaging in service projects to help prepare them for the CAS work they will take part in in their DP years. This includes brainstorming impactful initiatives, investigating issues, researching the need for help, planning, and setting meaningful goals. Many are cooperating with current after-school service activities and other NGOs. This will develop their leadership, teamwork, and critical thinking skills, as well as equip them with a service mindset that will empower them to overcome challenges and embrace the opportunities of the following years.

Here is a look at each Service group's project:

Interact (Gaia Pomodzi)

Only 13% of girls complete upper secondary school in Malawi, and among the poorest children, this falls to 2%. In Malawi, 42% of girls are married before the age of 18, and 9% are married before the age of 15. Cognisant of these dire issues, CAMFED is an organisation that works to integrate into Malawian society and aid in mitigating this barrier to education for secondary school girls to enable their full potential. In Interact, we have been planning and researching the ways in which we can contribute and integrate into this society considering matters of ethics, personal abilities, possible constraints, and models of action. As passionate individuals about the subject of education, we believe this project will be impactful for both women in Malawi and a valuable learning experience for us.

Permaculture Gardens

One of Malawi's biggest Issues, is their consistency in creating large landfills, because of these landfills, large sectors of areas become poisoned, animals die from ingesting the pollution and it can cause diseases. Our goal is to clean and educate local villages on the problems that arise from land pollution. Our plan is to go once every two weeks, in which we will travel to these large communities that suffer from large landfills. Once we have sorted and removed the trash that covers the land, through the help of the community, we will start to create gardens in these areas, planting crops such as beans, cassava, cabbage, and pumpkin leaves. Through the use of crop diversity, it doesn't ruin the soil's nutrients. Throughout this period we will be educating the community about the problems that arise through landfills, as well as solutions they can take to stop this from happening. We will teach about more educated ways of growing their food. This allows for us as well as the community to clean up Malawi together.

Sportssync:

Sports Sync aims to address issues in schools in Malawi's sports communities, including equipment scarcity, limited knowledge access, and a lack of ability to do certain sports. Sports Sync will work with sports coaching to get connected with schools and, in return, will help with fundraising and coaching. Lack of equipment hinders schools' sports, leading to fewer sports being played which can mess with physical growth while limited knowledge access gets in the way of everyday activities. Through collaborative efforts, Sports Sync endeavours to enhance sports engagement and opportunities within Malawi's school communities.

WHH:

One of the biggest issues primary public schools in Malawi face is the lack of knowledge about what is a nutritious balanced meal. Service Projects Continued

Project Child Malawi:

Due to little to no parental support, poverty, and being uneducated, some children, teens, and young adults have been staying around dumpsites, having to scavenge for food in these areas. This is unsanitary and can lead to these kids contracting lots of different sicknesses. Our goal is to raise awareness for these kids, raise money, and to donate things like clothes, shoes, toys, books, etc, so that we can keep them away from the dumpsites, and bring them back into school as well. We are working with an NGO called "Project Child Malawi" to help these kids stay away from the dumpsite, and hopefully find a permanent solution for them instead of temporary ones. Tawanda

Water Purifier:

A pressing issue in Malawi is the waterborne disease cholera. Which is caused by contaminated water. Through our research, we discovered that Malawi is dealing with a significant cholera death rate, implying that various people are facing challenges due to water quality issues. Our goal is to raise awareness about waterborne diseases and promote preventive measures. Community Crochet For KCH

We have identified a lack of resources for new mothers and their newborns at Kamuzu Central Hospital. To help solve this problem we will be crocheting and knitting soft goods (such as baby hats, socks, blankets, etc..) and donating them to new mothers at KCH or mothers who can't afford to buy these necessities for their newborns, or who don't have a community that can pass down these items to them. We will be selling a variety of handmade crocheted animals in the next few months to raise the funds to purchase our materials. 
Move this World




Neurodiversity Week 12th-16th Feb.

Grade 11 College Counseling Check-In

During career and college counseling sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday this week, Grade 11 students had an opportunity to work on BridgeU, our college counseling platform. They could research careers and colleges and keep their profile and activities list up-to-date. Additionally, they were encouraged to use the <u>Pre-College Program Digest</u> to consider experiences they can undertake before the start of next year to better position themselves for applying to university.

They were also reminded that today, Friday, February 23, is the registration deadline for the March 9 SAT, which will be administered on the BMIS campus. Any current Grade 11 student applying to university in the U.S. should be taking this exam. It can also be useful, situationally, for students applying to schools in other countries.

Finally, these students registered for the March 26 Council of International Schools Virtual College Fair with a focus on international schools in Africa and the Middle East. This will take place during the last two periods of class on that Tuesday. As I write this, 47 universities from 14 countries and 4 continents will be participating. It is a great opportunity for students to learn about specific schools, communicate with admissions representatives (through information sessions and 1-1 Zooms and text chats) and attend education sessions (focused on general themes, such as going to school in Canada and financing education). Despite the rollercoaster of emotions and nerves, the overwhelming amount of joy overpowered every other emotion. There are no words to describe the feeling of sitting in the general assembly in a room filled with 900 delegates at the UN headquarters in Nairobi. It was truly a blessing and privilege.

The first day started us off in full swing! Our delegates made us proud in Ecology, despite their resolution not being passed. Caren Kampondamgaga presented our resolution, followed by an amendment by Maya Munro and Ishika Vajpai to support it. In the Historical Decisions Committee, Mwayi Mhango delivered a strong opening statement. Fatima Kasmani represented Canada in a case against Syria in the International Court of Justice. The first day of the conference came to an end with a whopping majority of our delegates having the opportunity to speak, debate, and voice their opinions. Continued.



With an exciting end to the first day of the conference, we were refreshed and back at UNON on the second day 2. Fatima concluded her case with the Judging panel unanimously voting in favour of Canada!! As a guest speaker for ICJ, the applicant was under pressure and Fatima swooped in and provided the court with her knowledge and understanding of the issue. In the Special Summit, Tamanda delivered a closing statement for the opposition team debating the use of fossil fuels in African nations. Ishika was able to offer two points of information. Although the second day was slow-paced, the night ended with some smiles, laughs and jumps at the trampoline park.



On the third day, Mwayi Mhango had an opportunity to present part of her closing statement and initiated an opening statement. Fatima with confidence spoke against the hijab ban bill in France. Mwara Manyara, Abby Rukundo, and Gedeon Rami shared a point of information, and Tamanda delivered an opening and closing statement in the Special Summit. Furthermore, in the Human Rights Committee, Mwara Manyara presented our resolution to address medical concerns in Palestine. She spoke in a commanding and confident manner, convincingly answering follow up questions. This resolution was passed.



Day 4 brought the end of this year's MUN journey. Gabrielle Bizarro gave a brilliant speech on why his resolution should be supported, as well as Gedeon Raimi supporting this argument.
