During this academic year, one of our main focus areas evolved around 'intercultural awareness and global citizenship'. 


Welcome Back BMIS champs

Each college had its own specific requirements ranging from medium requirements, types of exploration, and average number of pieces. Unfortunately, I did not know this a year ago. I created a total of four artworks over the December break, three of which made it into my portfolio. Looking back, I enjoyed the experience of learning how to use new mediums, trying new concept explorations, and even choking on (fake) blood for my performance piece. It allowed me to discover more about my style as an artist. Each submission had an accompanying 200-word description. Recognising the heavy stakes of college supplemental writing, I was really worried about this. However, analysis from my DP HL art class had given me a strong enough foundation to confidently write over 2000 words in supplements. Overall, I would advise any prospective art major to indulge in this experience and not shy away from the tens of hours of work but see it as an opportunity to learn more about yourself.

Advice from the College Counsellor

Even though the second semester has only just begun, if your family is like mine, you're already planning where you will be and what you will be doing during the April break and the holiday beginning in lune.

If your child is in high school, you may want to include things that your son or daughter can do over these holidays that support their career and college search.

Whether you travel or stay in Malawi, they may want to:

- attend college fairs and visits (virtual and in-person) and information sessions from schools around the world, some of which are program/career-specific
- register for a summer program in leadership, an academic or professional areas, or to develop skills development
- pursue a passion
- work or volunteer
- job-shadow and take an internship
- take necessary entry exams (e.g. SAT and ACT in the U.S.; Thinking Skills Test, BMAT, etc. for UK universities) especially for current Gr 11 students over the June-August holiday.

The <u>Pre-College Program Digest</u> has been created to help you find programs (some free, some paid; some in-person, some online) that can help with the above. All of this is provided to help your child better understand what they want out of their future, learn how they can get there, develop important skills and understandings, round-out or provide depth to their list of experiences and activities, and improve their CV in ways that will make them more interesting and better prepared [read: admissible/hireable] people.

Thinking about your child's post-BMIS life (whether it's a couple of months away or a few years) can be both exhilarating and daunting. Starting early, planning, and building experiences, and understanding bit by bit can help make sure it's more of the former than the latter.

Grade 11 - Register for the March 9 SAT

Many U.S. schools are moving away from the test-optional approach to admissions and are requiring exam scores again. We are also finding that our students who are applying to UK schools with the U.S. high school diploma and IB courses (rather than the full diploma) are, more than in the past, being asked for (though generally not required) to provide SAT scores.

If your child is considering applying to the U.S. next year, it is strongly recommended that they take multiple SAT exams before submitting their applications, starting with the <u>March 9 SAT</u>, which will be administered on campus, and has a registration deadline of February 23. Taking this now will be good preparation for retaking the exam over the long holiday or next October or December at BMIS. Most schools take super scores (meaning they will cobble together the highest scores from multiple tests), and taking the test now will provide specific feedback on the areas of the exam students can target for improvement.

Once students have registered, they need to make sure that they have downloaded <u>Bluebook</u> onto their personal device (a Windows or Mac device -- NO CHROMEBOOKS, and iPads are discouraged). Once Bluebook is downloaded, students can take full-length or abridged practice exams on Bluebook to familiarize themselves with the test. I can also recommend <u>Khan Academy's SAT prep</u> as a good place to get ready. Our library also has test prep books on display.
