

Dear Parents and Guardians,

You may have wondered how teachers are recruited at international schools, the process involved and important deadlines along the way. Mr Moody, Mrs Engels and myself have just returned from a successful recruiting fair in London this week.

The process at BMIS begins in October, which seems very early on when you are recruiting for the academic year ahead, but this is a necessary practice for teachers on the international circuit, who need to indicate to their schools as early as October-November if they intend to stay or leave. In addition, new positions begin to be posted by schools from this stage onwards. It is also a necessary practice for international schools to begin the recruitment process as soon as they are aware that there is going to be a definite vacancy. It is important to start as early as possible to ensure access to the best candidates. We use several recruiting platforms:

- Search Associates. This is the largest and most respected recruitment agency for international schools. They have online databases so we can contact candidates who we are interested in and candidates can contact us online expressing interest in any of our vacancies. They also conduct 13 face-to-face job fairs between January to April each year in places such as London, Bangkok, Melbourne, Cambridge, Dubai, etc. Each fair attracts different categories of candidates. BMIS historically uses London-January because this fair is the largest and attracts the more internationally **IB** experienced candidates.
- Schrole. Schrole is an online database system where we advertise our vacancies and we can search for candidates and candidates can, like Search, express interest in our posted vacancies.
- Teacher Horizons. Again this is an online service but it does not have the 'reach' that Search and Schrole have.
- All positions available are advertised locally in newspapers and are added to our website.

The most effective recruitment strategy is a combination of online recruitment and fair attendance. Online recruitment allows the school to access every candidate especially those who have indicated an interest in Africa. While recruitment fairs (Search) allow a more stringent review of candidates.

The results from our latest recruitment at the SEARCH London Fair have been very successful with several highly qualified and experienced teachers filling our vacancies for 2024-5.

# **Safeguarding and Child Protection lessons at BMIS**

This week, students from Grades 6 to 10 engaged in an insightful exploration of the concept of Identity-based harm. As defined by the Council of International Schools, Identity-based harm occurs when individuals are targeted for bullying based on an aspect of who they are or are perceived to be. This form of bullying is also known as "prejudice-based bullying." Our students reviewed the definitions of identity and bullying, fostering a deeper understanding of these concepts. They took time to reflect on the importance of acknowledging and respecting others for who they are, recognising the significance of leaving biases behind. These reflective discussions are essential within our international school community, characterised by its rich diversity. In an environment that thrives on cultural differences, it becomes imperative for every member of our community to adopt culturally sensitive approaches. Through these discussions, we aim to cultivate a more welcoming and inclusive school environment where each individual feels valued and accepted.

# **Developments in Language Acquisition classes**

In today's MYP Language Acquisition English class for Grade 8, students embarked on an engaging journey that combined language practice, literature exploration, and self-reflection.

The lesson began with an energetic warm-up activity, where students randomly selected conversation topics and had one minute to share their thoughts with their peers. This exercise aimed to provide a comfortable space for students to express themselves, laying the groundwork for their upcoming assessments in Phase 3, where they are expected to speak for 3-4 minutes.

Currently, students are studying "The Midnight Fox" by Betsy Bayers. Today's class focused on scanning a text to find key information to write a summary. From there, students analyzed a diary entry, focusing on the conventions and language used.

Putting their newfound knowledge to the test, students planned their diary entries, utilizing the information they had scanned. This practical application allowed them to reinforce their understanding of the material while fostering creativity in written expression.

Crucially, the lesson also emphasized the development of self-management and reflection skills. Students pondered questions such as "What can I already do?" and "How can I share my skills to help peers who need more practice?" This reflective exercise serves as a cornerstone for their personal growth in language acquisition.

A special shout-out goes to Oskar, who exemplified outstanding support and leadership. Oskar guided his peers to relevant chapters, aiding them in finding crucial information. He demonstrated excellent self-management and reflection skills: "How can I share my skills to help peers who need more practice?". It was a great day's lesson all around by the students. Our following lessons finalize the end of our novel study.
