#### **BMIS IDU Week**

IDU stands for Interdisciplinary Unit. This is a unit of inquiry that allows students to "integrate bodies of knowledge and modes of thinking from two or more established areas of knowledge to create a new understanding that would have been unlikely through a single disciplinary means."

Students and teachers have been engaged in a range of collaborative subject-specific and interdisciplinary learning experiences this week and reflecting on the process. ### Grade 6: Promises and Polls: Unravelling political campaigns

During this IDU, students combined their learning from Language and Literature and Individuals and Societies to consider the way that these subjects intersected in the exploration of modern political campaigning. They considered how communication is used in politics to exercise power over communities. They had an opportunity to collaboratively create their own political campaign recognising how language is a powerful tool to shape public opinion and influence votes.

In Grade 6, we did an Interdisciplinary unit where we mixed two astounding subjects together and created a masterpiece. But what was that masterpiece??? Individuals and Societies and Language and Literature. In I&S, We looked at politics and political parties and how different political parties work in different countries. In Lang and Lit, we looked at speeches and how to make your speeches empathetic Important, and entertaining, We looked into strategies on how to enhance

ways of performing, for example, projecting your voice, or performing with a carrot in your mouth to make sure you speak clearly. We also collaborated with other people that we weren't really used to. We were able to step outside our comfort zones and be risk-takers! The Grade 6 IDU has been such an outstanding unit because we only applied 2 subjects to our minds, and together, we made it special. We spoke about the global issues in Malawi and how we could fix them, this was all from 2 SUBJECTS. It really was an amazing experience.





# Grade 7: Agency, Action, and Engagement

Our Grade 7 students completed their IDU during Semester 1, in Science and Individuals and Societies. So we had prepared another fantastic opportunity for them during IDU week, and that is exploring student agency, action, and engagement. Throughout the week, guided by Kathryn Leaper and Atu Mdeza, students explored the meaning of agency, action, and engagement and developed an understanding of how they can become active participants in bringing about what they hope for! Students will have an opportunity to reflect on how they already engaged as global citizens, and possibilities for further engagement in our local and global communities.

## <u>Review</u>

This week, our Grade 7 students embarked on a journey of engagement, learning, and reflection. We began with the video "Gnu Gnu," exploring the impact of our actions, followed by creating Venn diagrams to understand service and engagement. Mindful breathing exercises helped focus on passions, leading to the creation of vision boards on global issues like poverty. Using the "circle of concern" framework, students understood personal and global impacts. They

rated their engagement in service activities, reflected on making a bigger impact, and visually represented their passions through vision boards. Celebrating achievements, setting goals, and writing pledges for next year, students learned to think critically and take meaningful action to positively impact their communities.



#### Grade 8: Circus Olay!

This interdisciplinary unit connects Physical and Health Education, Theatre, Visual Arts, and Music with the main aim of creating a performance that expressed a narrative of a real-world issue. Each subject brought forward specific disciplinary skills and knowledge to help express a story.

## Grade 9 IDU - Beauty and the

Our Grade 9 students explored the modern issue of whether Artificial Intelligence is capable of manufacturing creativity. This involved students trying to think like an AI, and exploring whether the beauty of a poem or song can be quantified, and then whether the data gathered can be used to manufacture or replicate a poem. Students created poetry that explores these patterns and presents them in unique ways! <u>Review</u>

During the course of the IDU program, we engaged in an in-depth study of poetry by examining mathematical patterns found in the poems and lyrics and how they contribute to the beauty of the poem. We looked at poetic devices such as metaphorical verbs, alliteration, and repetition and explored mathematical ways to quantify these devices such as using ratios.

We discussed what makes something "beautiful" and how it is possible to mold something we create to make it more beautiful. We ended up using algorithms to try and replicate the form of "beautiful" poems. We acted as AI and tried to follow our rules to create our poems, which we all found to be much harder than it sounded. We each wrote two poems, one with an algorithm and our own theme, and one with an algorithm and a class theme (we ended up voting on addiction).

# Grade 10: Power All Day Every Day?

Our Grade 10 students investigated how to potentially improve Malawi's energy problems and presented their proposals. During the interdisciplinary learning process, students collaborated to synthesize their understanding of Physics, Chemistry, and Design of energy changes, electromagnetic induction, and the idea of electrical systems to understand the complexity of power generation systems. They went on a field trip to JCM Solar in Salima District, and had an opportunity to collaboratively present their proposals "Dragon Den" style!

# Grade 10 IDU Trip to JMC Power

The Grade 10 Interdisciplinary Unit (IDU) students enjoyed an educational trip to the JCM Power to experience the intricacies of solar energy. This hands-on excursion allowed students to explore the practical applications of solar power, observing cutting-edge solar panel technology and sustainable energy practices. Guided by staff at JCM Power in the field, the students were allowed to see the solar panels up close and learn more about the efficiency and environmental benefits of harnessing solar energy.

This experience not only enriched their understanding of renewable energy sources but also inspired them to consider the broader implications of

sustainable living and the role of technology in addressing global energy challenges. The students were able to research/ identify other renewable energies during IDU week, such as wind, biomass, and hydropower. On the final day of IDU week, Grade 10 students presented their innovative ideas for renewable energy solutions to the younger grades. Jax Corbett
