

Grade 8 French: Exploring Health and Well-Being Through Creativity

In our Grade 8 French classes, we're delving into the theme of La Santé et Le Bien-Être—Health and Well-Being. To engage students in learning vocabulary related to the body and descriptions, we've introduced a creative project that adds a fun twist to traditional lessons. Students are designing their own monsters, animals, or aliens and describing their

physical characteristics in detail.

Our first step was to do an Inquiry into which words and which kind of words we would need to know in order to effectively describe a person or a being. This created our vocabulary list of body parts and adjectives. We investigated adjectival agreement and placement (where the correct form of the adjectives is placed in relation to the nouns in the sentence) and then we set off to create our own personal pet monsters.

After crafting their descriptions, students bring these imaginative creatures to life through drawings, either by hand or with the help of AI tools. Once completed, each student presents their creation to the class. During these presentations, classmates listen carefully, trying to visualize or even draw the character based on the description they hear.


The monster they create will become a central figure throughout our unit on health and well-being. Students will explore ailments their monsters might experience, potential visits to the doctor, and receive advice on maintaining good health while avoiding bad habits.

Assessment will be based on several aspects: the richness of their vocabulary, the accuracy and creativity of their descriptive adjectives, and the effectiveness of their oral presentation. This activity not only reinforces prior knowledge but also encourages students to build new understanding by making meaningful connections.
